LSS Update Ken Glazer

The years of hoping; the years of hard work and the feelings of success came together June 3 with the raising of the Lakeland School System flag at Lakeland Elementary. What started with Norris/Todd in 2011, stalled in 2012 when the vote was invalidated and started anew in 2013 is now reality.

On May 10 the State of Tennessee approved Lakeland's operation plan allowing LSS to begin its first school this August. Dr. Ted Horrell, superintendent, will present the Mayor and Commissioners, Lakeland School System's first annual, LSS Board of Education approved, balanced budget for full funding at the Board of Commissioners meeting June 12.

By the numbers

The first-year budget projects income and expenses at \$6,755,105 for a balanced budget.

More good news

The Shelby County Commission voted to amend its budget and fund \$4,805,000 of capital improvement projects. Lakeland Elementary will receive \$990,000 for a new roof and 83 roof top HVAC units.

The Board approved its Mission, Beliefs, and Vision statement at an April 14 meeting. The document was developed at a board retreat April 11. This guiding document will serve as a touchstone for the Board as it moves toward the creation, development and growth of the new school system

Attention to detail

During the past three months the Board of Education reviewed, discussed and passed 160 policy items affecting all areas of the school system. Lest you think there is not much more work to be done, Dr. Horrell says he plans to bring the Board 25 to 30 more policy items before the start of school. Additionally, there are state legislation update sessions to be attended and ongoing work to make sure the first day of school runs as smoothly as humanly possible.

On May 20 the Board received the student population data projections, termed the Facilities Needs Assessment, and started to work immediately on assessing how many and what size schools will be needed to serve the middle and high school student population in three to seven years.

With the student population defined, based on a 4.75 percent annual housing growth rate and .046 students per household, the Board passed a motion to proceed with finding building sites and beginning negotiations to acquire the best property.

Doug Swink of Renaissance Realty in Eads recommended six building sites for a new middle or middle/high school at the June 3 Board meeting. Consisting of about 70 acres, the sites are large enough for a high school with ball fields and track and were identified in current and future growth areas. A motion passed to proceed with the creation of a five and a seven-year capital improvement plan. The focus will be on a 1,000-student middle school under the five-year plan and a possible high school within seven years. The Board's goal is to have all students attending Lakeland schools sooner rather than later. Building a new school requires three to four years from negotiations to the open date. Ideally, that would happen before the inter-local agreement with Arlington ends in seven years.

Lakeland Has A Newly Formed Education Foundation

A fund-raising organization to benefit Lakeland schools has been established. Lakeland Education Foundation, a 501(c)(3) pending, non-profit corporation dedicated to securing and distributing resources to Lakeland schools has been formed. The announcement was made by its chairman Cecil Tompkins.

Lakeland was the only municipal school system without a foundation. "With the challenges and opportunities ahead for our school system, it was time to proceed with the formation," said Cecil. Education foundations are widely used to raise additional funding for enhanced curriculum activities, building and expansion support and teacher grants. The grants allow schools to provide learning experiences above and beyond what is available in typical school budgets.

Teachers can apply for these grants through an application process that outlines what they expect their students to gain from the additional funding. According to Dr. Ted Horrell, Lakeland School superintendent, the Germantown schools, of which he was formerly a part, were able to provide a higher degree of excellence due to the tremendous funding and support from their foundation.

The Lakeland Foundation's goal is to accomplish those same ideals for Lakeland Schools. "Students who are provided enhanced learning opportunities are more likely to score higher grades and are better prepared to move to the next level of schooling," Cecil stated. "We want to be a part of making that happen."

The Foundation expects to award grants during the upcoming school year. The number of grants available will be determined by the success of its fund-raising efforts. Like most education foundations, the Lakeland Foundation hopes to secure a significant amount of its funding from the business community, but also expects various fund-raising activities and strong parent support. With discussions already under way to expand Lakeland schools to K-12, there are expectations the Foundation will be needed in an even greater way as it moves forward.

The board of the Foundation represents a cross section of the community. In addition to Cecil as chair, Michele Murgatroyd is vice chairman; Ryan McDaniel, secretary; Don Barber, treasurer; and Ken Blevins, director. Nancy Harrell, Hank Hess and Joretha Lockhart are advisory board members. The group expects to add additional board members in the coming months.

Inside the BOC Meetings *(Board of Commissioners)*

It is one of the most important events for Lakeland in recent years, contributing to future development and economic growth.

"It" is the construction slated to start in July on the I-40 interchange at Canada Road.

At the April 3 BOC work session, Chris Thomas, city manager, characterized the I-40 interchange work as being an important event in the recent history of Lakeland. At that meeting, the BOC authorized \$3 million for the construction deposit. The money is part of the City's capital budget, but Mayor Wyatt Bunker said this is still a big deal for Lakeland. He said this project was started in 2008, construction will start in July and the process will continue for three years. "Three years of fun," said Vice Mayor Sherri Gallick.

As construction starts on the interstate, July also will bring a new element to recycling in Lakeland. Republic Services has a new contract with the City and as part of a cost-saving effort, will implement a different and larger recycling container.

As reported at the May 1 work session, trash pickup bids were received from Republic Services and Waste Connections. Republic currently has the service for Lakeland but was to be terminated this summer because of poor service. The company put in a bid to continue the service saying they have been trying to meet or exceed expectations. Their bid is less than their current contract with Lakeland. They have new equipment and recycling will improve. The plan is to provide a 96-gallon recycling container to each address and it will be serviced every other week. With a new automated truck, the expectation is to decrease residents' fees by 20 percent. Spokesmen for Waste Connections said they would use similar equipment and provide better service to Lakeland residents. Mayor Wyatt Bunker noted that both companies have good references, but all things considered, the lower price would be advisable. Thus the contract with Republic was accepted and the small recycling bins will no longer be serviced by Republic. Each resident will receive the 96-gallon container this summer.

Also making news at the BOC meetings this spring:

- The BOC agreed to spend \$2,600 for "fall protection" mulch in the play area by City Hall. It is material approved by the state and must be used in play areas.
- Jim Atkinson, director of planning and administration, announced Kensington Manor subdivision, off Highway 70 by Evergreen, has a new developer and wants to eliminate a pool originally planned for the development.
- The municipal athletic fields were reintroduced with the suggestion that 100 acres the City already owns near IH Park be utilized for the sports complex. About 15 acres could be used for four soccer fields, three baseball and softball fields, all for youth. There would be parking and a concession stand and perhaps bike and hiking trails back to IH Park. Wyatt said this route would be cheaper than getting new land for a park. He said there is money set aside for a park using impact fees and grant funds. Commission Gene Torrey countered that Lakeland residents deserve a full service park built in four or five phases. The sports complex

is still under discussion by the Parks and Recreation Committee.

- The Equestria neighborhood, near Memphis Arlington Road and The Grove, has asked for another extension. The developers also want to dedicate a park to the City instead of having it maintained by the neighborhood. Wyatt said he would prefer NOT to maintain parks all over the city and instead let those areas be covered by HOAs.
- About 15 senior citizens stayed through the lengthy May 3 session to present their cases for extended hours and more programs at Lakeland's Senior Center. They would like to have the building open at least 16 hours a week with a part-time director. They think a camera or key pad entry system is not feasible and suggested all seniors pay \$12 in annual dues. They also suggested that the center serve residents starting at age 50 instead of the current 55. Commissioner Clark Plunk commented that seniors get less and less and we should show more respect, noting the City should provide this service.
- At the May 8 regular meeting, there was a lively discussion about annexation of the Bolton area. Jim Atkinson said the City staff recommended against the annexation, based on a feasibility study. Gene Torrey, commissioner said he would like to see the numbers for annexation of area A and part of area B. Jim said it would take about 30 days to analyze annexation of part of the Bolton area. The rural area was examined in smaller parts: A through E. Two scenarios were analyzed at annexing parts A & B versus annexing parts A, B, C & D. Area E was eliminated from consideration. Both scenarios 1 & 2 were rejected because capital expenditures would far exceed property tax revenue and operational expenditures would exceed intergovernmental revenue.

Well, it's been a busy couple of months and it will be a busy couple of months coming up.

On April 22 we had a reception for the development community at Stonebridge. The purpose was to let the local-area business community know that Lakeland is open for business with a renewed focus on developing Lakeland into a premier area for businesses and families.

There were approximately 80 people there from developers to architects, engineers, banks and homebuilders. The new Mayor, Wyatt Bunker, the Board of Commissioners and city planning staff were there to speak to how Lakeland is changing the way it does business.

On May 3, we had a great turn out for our bi-annual Community Cleanup Day. We had over 100 residents drop off items for the landfill. The Mayor and Vice Mayor came out and assisted Lakeland staff.

At our May meeting, the Board of Commissioners decided to look at a smaller area in the Bolton annexation study to see if it is feasible. If so, the residents would be allowed to vote.

The Canada Road interchange will break ground in July. This project will be constructed in several phases and will take approximately two and one-half to three years to complete the entire project. We will have details of the construction process on the website.

Starting in July, we will have a new solid waste contract. The company is still Republic Services, but in an effort to save money and reduce costs, we are going to the 96 gallon recycling bins to be picked up every other week. The smaller bins will no longer be used. If you do not want the larger cart, let us know. Republic will still pick up the yard waste cart and two small bundles of limbs or bags. The City will start to pick up other limbs up to a certain size. We will get that

information out ASAP. We will no longer be distributing the landfill certificates. Residents can go directly to the landfill and pay them directly.

Also, the School Board has announced they are hiring a consultant to look at a possible site for a new middle or high school.

She will serve as the first principal of the school under the banner of the new Lakeland School System. Current principal Marcia Crouch, who retired at the end of the school year, is working closely with Joretha to ensure a smooth transition.

She was assistant principal from the school opening 13 years ago. Prior to that she was a classroom teacher at Southwind Elementary School. Joretha received her bachelor's degree from the University of Memphis and a master's degree in curriculum and instruction from Union University. She also earned her Education Specialist degree from Union. Her husband is a principal in the Shelby County Schools system, and they have two sons.

During the April announcement to LES faculty, where she was given a standing ovation, Joretha said, "I will work to make sure every student, parent, teacher, staff member and community member feels important and involved in the place I call home, Lakeland Elementary School."

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And there is a hotline for that: 867-2716. The staff will investigate the complaint and assign a case number. The complainant will receive status updates. Any right of way violations will be reported to the Shelby County Sheriff's Department.

As director of planning and administration, Jim Atkinson directs the code enforcement department as well as parks, planning and economic development, general administration and the "Keep America Beautiful" program.

Jim said Matt Brown is the code enforcement officer who also inspects new subdivision construction. He is assisted by public works crews who also spot problems and report back to Matt. Jim said Matt no longer does administrative work so that allows him to spend more time patrolling the City for violations.

Temporary signs like yard sale or real estate are not allowed off premises unless a community event is being promoted like the Easter Egg Hunt or a community garage sale. For anything else, the sign or signs are removed.

Parking violations come under the Shelby County Sheriff's Department, but "if we see it, we will report the violation," said Jim. He noted that if many complaints are received for a specific issue, Matt can work on weekends or evenings to witness the offense.

It's rare to have a complaint about noise, but Lakeland does have a noise ordinance, which would address, for example, a loud band playing in a residential area.

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Bring your Developments to Lakeland

"We are open for business," 80 attendees were told at an April 22 "Lakeland Open for Business" session at Stonebridge Golf Club and sponsored by the City of Lakeland.

Jim Atkinson, director of planning and administration for the City, told residential and commercial developers, bankers and real estate agents that Lakeland will maintain requirements for high quality products. "We have streamlined processes for development approvals," he said. "Roughly 75 percent of Lakeland is undeveloped with good commercial spaces north of the new I-40 exchange."

He shared with the audience that Lakeland has reduced fees, new development codes, reorganized staff and a Lakeland Development Commission coming soon.

Kevin Floyd, chair of the Lakeland School System Board, announced they want to make the system K through 12 considering the City's growth and student needs. Dr. Ted Horrell, school superintendent, said starting with only one school is a great opportunity to do what is best for students.

Wyatt Bunker, mayor, added Lakeland will have facilities and an education system to compete with private institutions.

Also in attendance were Chris Patterson, city attorney who is credited with the idea for the session; Chris Thomas, city manager; and all members of the Board of Commissioners.

Questions raised during the program:

- How much time will be saved under the new streamlined development plan? Residential depends on size the of project and commercial 30 days.
- What is the time table for I-40 interchange construction? Bid will be let in June with construction starting in July, 2-1/2 years to complete.
- What about state and fed monies for schools? Kevin Floyd explained money follows the students.

Crime Report for Lakeland

For March, there were 24 incidents, the highest on Mondays and between 10 p.m. and 2 a.m. Showing a decrease were burglaries/other and motor vehicle thefts. There were increases in burglaries/residential, thefts from vehicles and vandalism/misdemeanor felony. Crime decreased in burglary/other, motor vehicle theft and stayed the same in five categories: aggravated assault, burglary/business, other larceny, robbery/individual and theft from a building.

Statistics for April showed the only crime category increase was larceny/other with an increase of two incidents compared to zero for the month before. All other categories stayed the same or decreased.

During both months there were a number of “lawful” entries resulting in thefts. This means thieves were able to steal items without breaking into vehicles, homes or businesses. The Sheriff’s Department noted that it is always important to lock doors on cars and to buildings and homes.

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

